EDDINGTON VIETNAM WAR VETERAN

I enlisted in the US Air Force in June, 1969. I was sent to Lackland AFB, Texas for six weeks of basic training. I attended

weapons specialist training school at Lowry AFB, Aurora, Colorado for 18 weeks. In December 1969 I was assigned to the 48th Tactical Fighter Wing (Liberty Wing), RAF Lakenheath, England. I worked in the weapons release shop, gun



shop and on a weapons configuration crew. During the next two years, I was deployed on multiple temporary duty (TDY) assignments throughout Europe as part of NATO and other joint operations. The TDYs lasted from two weeks to several months.

Military service in Europe was as good as it got. RAF Lakenheath operated three squadrons of F-100 Super Sabers. We spent a lot of time training and maintaining the aircraft guns and weapon release systems. The F-100s were old; built during the 1950's. To my knowledge, a sortie was never missed.

In early 1972, RAF Lakenheath was phasing out the F-100s and transitioning to F-4D/E Phantom II. All maintenance and weapons personnel were being trained on the F-4s. During the same time period, we were preparing the F-100s to be reassigned in the US. In the late spring we were a TFW wing without aircraft.

At about that time, President Nixon had ordered a drawdown of permanent troops stationed in Vietnam. Some of them were being replaced with TDY troops from various European units. Starting in May, RAF Lakenheath sent three detachments to bases in Thailand or Okinawa, Japan. I was in the fourth detachment which was sent to the Det. 1, 377th ABW, Bien Hoa, Vietnam in August, 1972.

I was assigned as a weapons load crew chief (four man crew). Our mission was to 'quick turn' tactical fighter aircraft. USAF F-4s and A-7s from Thailand would make combat sorties on a target, in-air refuel, and land at Bien Hoa. We would re-arm them with the designated ordinance. They would make a second strike and return from whence they came. The goal was to get them airborne in the least amount of time possible. At Lakenheath, it would take over an hour and a half to load and arm 18 500 pound bombs. At Bien Hoa, we loaded them in about 45 minutes. Some days we would turn as many as 30 aircraft with four weapon load crews.

Bien Hoa came under attack on nine occasions between our arrival and the cease fire. We were hit with from 1 to 64 B122 rockets and/or mortars. There were two sapper attacks and several contacts on the perimeter. During that time two aircraft were destroyed and 26 were damaged. Many men were wounded and one was killed before the cease fire.

All of us, from Lakenheath on TDY to Vietnam, returned home unharmed. Since we were assigned to the 377th ABW, we are authorized the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award with the Combat Valor device, Vietnam Service Medal with Bronze Service Star, RVN Gallantry Cross Medal with Palm, and the RVN Campaign Medal.

In June of 1973, I received an Honorable Discharge with the rank of Staff Sergeant (E-5).

For wreaths on a winter's day.

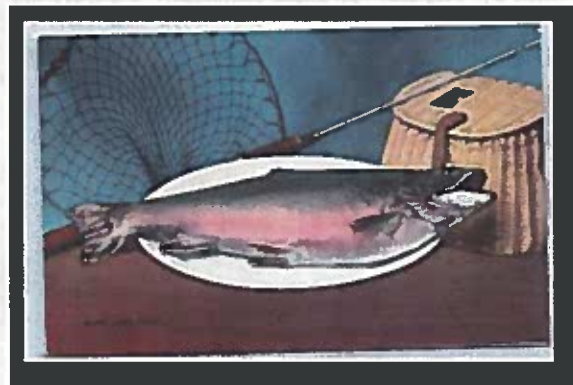
What can I do on a summer's day?

Quick German Coffee Cake


1 c. sweet milk	1 heaping tsp. butter	1
egg	½ tsp. salt	2 tsp. baking
powder	½ c. sugar	flour enough to make a stiff batter



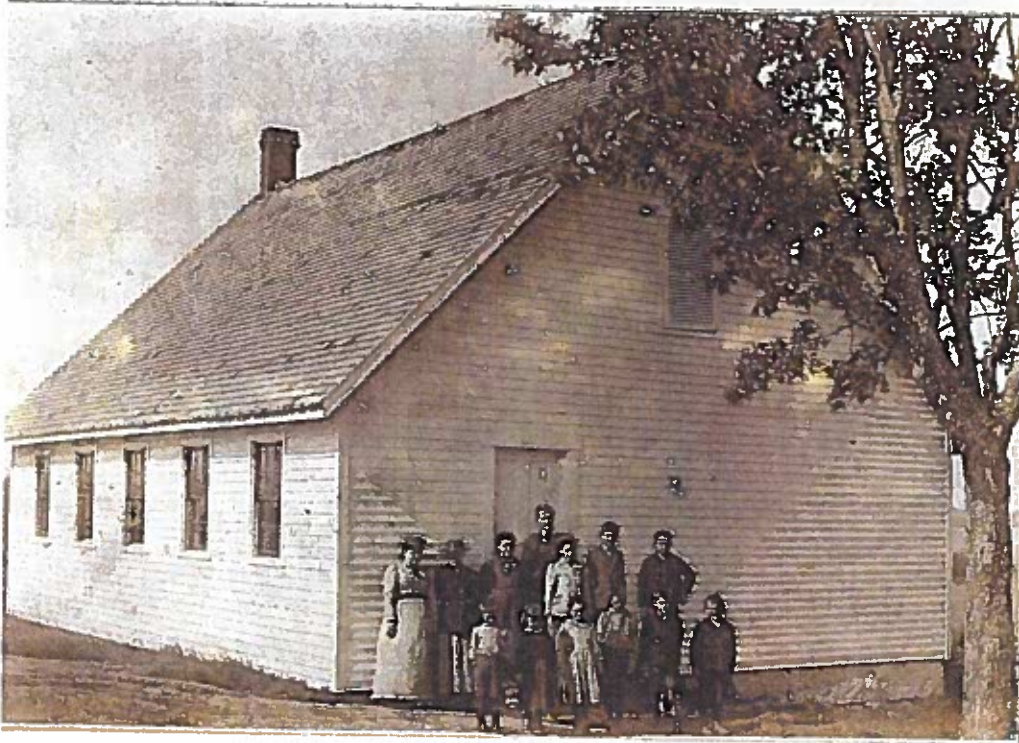

Pictured Top: Portion of March 1871 school report for School House #7.

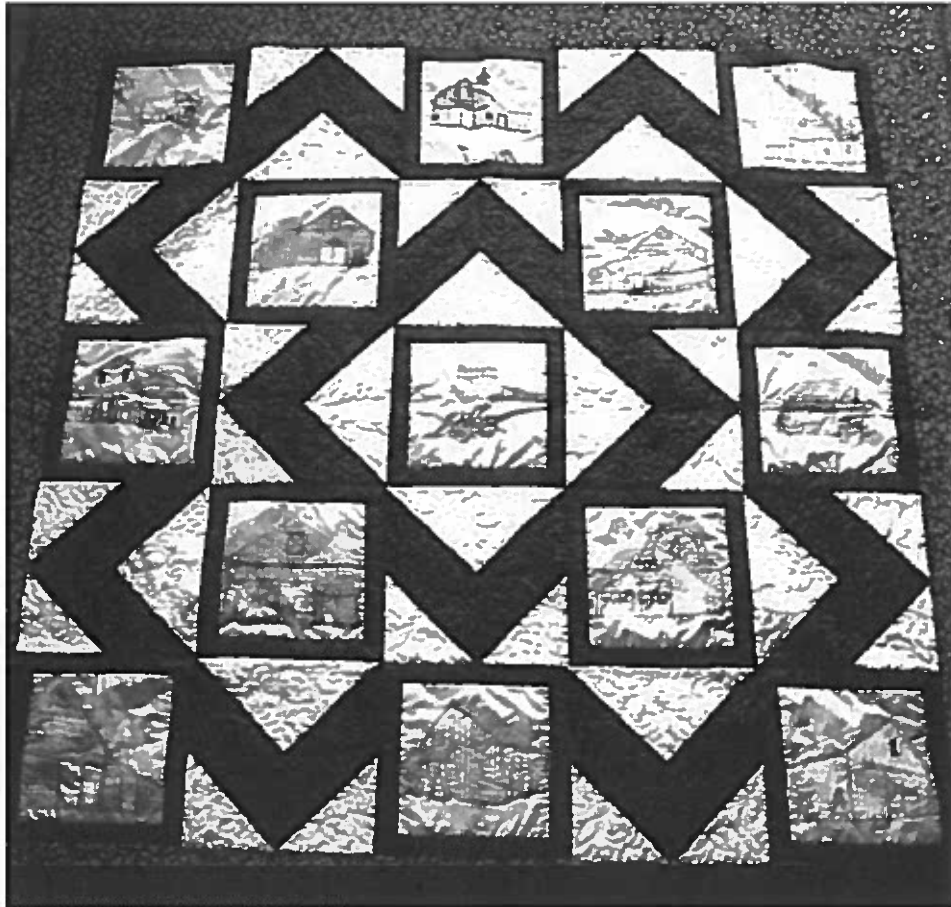
Pictured Bottom: School House # 7, formerly across the road from Pine Tree Cemetery on Rt. 46.
